Convention 2024

The NEC, acting on Sport Irelands directive to fulfill the gender quota, inducted three ladies to NEC at a meeting in Templemore on the 8th of December '23.At convention 2024the ladies were elected in the following positions. Ger Holland (secretary) Margaret O Riordan (Munster/Connaught coordinator) Frances Ryan (communications and media officer). We wish them the best of luck going forward in their new roles. The following is a brief profile of the NEC's newest honorary secretary by John Manning.

Ger Holland Honorary Secretary Pitch and Putt Ireland



Ger Holland began her Pitch and Putt career at the now defunct Dublin Postal club and claimed second place in the 1995 National Junior Strokeplay championship at Portmarnock. The Dublin player took that silver medal on the back eighteen from Mary O'Donovan (Collins) after the pair had tied on 122, four behind winner Rita Guerin (Navan).

Ger has twice won Best Gross at the Dublin Mixed Foursomes Stableford (Des Flanagan Memorial Trophy) with Darren Thornberry (R.G.S.C.), at Glenville in 2015 and with John Lawlor (R.G.S.C.) at Ring Commons two years later. The R.G.S.C. stalwart holds three provincial Inter-County silver medals, earned at Lucan in 2010, St. Bridgets (2016) and Lough Owel (2017).

One of Ger's best days on the course came at Old County in September 2015 when she posted a two-round tally of 109 to win the All Ireland Ladies (Over 55) Senior Grade Strokeplay Championship by three from Margaret Hogan (Tullamore).In 2023, Ger narrowly

failed to add a second All Ireland Ladies (Over 55) Senior Grade Strokeplay title at Glenville. On this occasion 109 left the Dublin lady in second place, behind Geraldine Ward (Portmarnock)

She was runner-up in the 2020 Dublin Ladies Strokeplay Championship at Shandon and in the 2022 Dublin Matchplay at Lucan.Ger has represented Dublin with distinction in the Inter-County arena. She featured on the Dublin team that clinched national honours in 2016 at R.G.S.C. with a total of 571, that was eleven better than runners-up Kildare.

A regular qualifier for the final round of the National Ladies Strokeplay championship, Ger was twice a National Matchplay semi-finalist, losing to Geraldine Ward on each occasion (at Seapointin 2016 and Tullamore in 2018).

In addition to sterling administrative service to her current club R.G.S.C., Ger has acted on the National Ladies Committee and Pitch and Putt Ireland Strategic Planning Committees.

Safeguarding level 1

In March, 60 members from around the country completed and were certified on the Safeguarding in sport level 1 course. Level 2 and 3 safeguarding took place in April. Incompliance with Sport Ireland's Safeguarding policy there are now almost 100 club children's officers certified in Ireland. This is a great step forward to protecting and safeguarding our children and those who are responsible for them.

Johnny Shoer By John Manning

John Manning shares his own memories of a man that was known throughout the country for his wit and his pitch and putt skills. Everyone who met him will have a story to tell. Enjoy this throwback to the 80s and 90s with the late great Johnny Shoer.

Back in the early 1980s, I was an aspiring young player from St. Stephen's in Cork. I was delighted to qualify for the 1981 Munster Matchplay finals. I was drawn against Tipperary's John Shoer. I met him on the first tee at Catholic Institute. He was shambling around beforehand, complaining about his health problems, wondering whether he would be able to finish the match and then he proceeded to beat me "out the gate"! What a character! Riverdale Scratch Cup was a tournament he made his own in the early 1980s, winning on two occasions and contending many times. He also acted as a welcoming starter for the tournament. Fittingly, John Shoer Junior won Riverdale Scratch Cup in 2001.

Newsletter by Frances Ryan Contributions and editing by John Manning Originally a member of the now-defunct Sallygrove club in Nenagh, the late Johnny Shoer represented Riverdale with distinction and became one of the most recognised and cheerful faces in the world of Pitch and Putt. Amid tremendous scenes of celebration at

Hillview in 1981, Tipperary (Leonard Devine, Jimmy Hough, JohnnyShoer, Roy Linden and John Shortt) took their second ever National Inter-County title. Their score of 384 was two clear of runners-up Meath.

In 1984 at Rocklodge, John Shoerjoint top scored with 96 for a Tipperary quintet, that also included John Shortt, Roy Linden, Noel Joyce and Seamus Leavy, which finished third in the National Inter-County championship. The Tipp side scored 397 behind victors Cork and second-placed Dublin.

In the National Gent's Inter-County Tipperary Championship of 1990.at Hills, Tipperary (Paddy Kennedy, Sean Minogue, John Shoer, Robert Clear and Sean Keane) finished third on 392, outscored only by winners Cork and runners-up Limerick.

A week on from a famous 1991 hurling success by the blue and gold, the Pitch and Putt men from the Premier County almost won the National Gents Inter-County championship at Lucan. Noel Joyce, Sean Minogue, Richard O'Halloran, John Shoerand Anthony Culhanefired a team total of 388, which claimed second spot, just four behind host county Dublin(Mark Keane, Derek Courtney, Sean Harkins, Anthony Malone and Pat Brennan).

Tipperary County champion in the successive years of 1978 and 1979 and many times subsequently, Johnny was a fixture on the Tipperary County Board for many years. The popular Nenagh man was actually Chairman of the first ever Tipperary County Board in 1970 and later Secretary and Vice Chairman. Tipperary County Board's annual Scratch Cup honours the memory of the great Johnny Shoer.
